I first remember seeing Sara in her role as founder and producer back in the days when the still running Choreographers' Concert was The Woodstock Choreographers' Concert, and my daughter, Syelle, was a young dancer performing in someone's new, cutting edge piece.

I no longer remember who that choreographer was, but I have been blessed since then, to have gotten to know, work with, study from, meditate with, get hands-on healing from, and dance on stage with, the renowned and amazing Sara Miot!

Both my daughters went on to study with Sara at the Saugerties Ballet Center, performing in the annual Spring Dance Festival, and even more notably in A Christmas Carol, in which I too, was fortunate enough to have landed a couple of roles over the years. In fact, I remember clearly being part of the creation of the very first ever Street Scene, the first year A Christmas Carol was presented, not even yet completed, but already full of the magnificent promise it would later fulfill and ultimately surpass.

As an instructor during many of the same years as Sara at SBC, one of my greatest joys has been watching my very young students move up the ranks, year after year in the roles of A Christmas Carol; from Running Girls to Cratchet kids, to Sprites, Ghosts, and everything inbetween. What joy and artistic opportunity this annual production has provided the dancers at SBC! And what a special, heart-warming magic, always and unfailingly, has the show bestowed on its spellbound audiences throughout the years. How ironic it is to be thinking of the show as something in the past, at the same moment we must do so also, of Sara herself. Surely we will see it performed again, and many times. Yet for so many of us it is such a part of Sara, it almost makes sense that the Spirit of all the 'Christmas Carols Past' would quietly go missing at the Christmas of her passing, in order to accompany her somehow, at least on part of her journey, to return when the time is right, with her blessings eternally bestowed on all future performers and audiences.

There is one more special memory of Sara that lives in my heart. It is of the year she decided to return to performing herself, and she invited me and our dear friend, the brilliant Julie Manna, to dance with her! We performed at The Colony Café in Woodstock, each of us given by our choreographer, (Sara), moments of personal movement expression, before swirling back again and again into our trio of three wild women with flashing eyes – scarves – drama – dancing for Woodstock, for ourselves, and for each other in that wordless profundity that is dance. Sara, thank you. Thank you so very much.
